## **Twenty Years of Great Music at Bethany**

Taras Nahirniak was hired as our new director of music in June of 2001. For the following twenty years he has continued Bethany's long tradition of having an exceptional music program!

Since its very beginning in 1948, our church has been blessed to have dedicated and talented directors of music. For the first 10 years church members volunteered their time. Then Art Becknell was hired and for 35 years he taught and inspired the chancel choir, which grew in number and strength. Following Art's sudden death, Carol Brendel took over for three years and then Bill Busch for four years.

In September of 2000, nine months prior to Taras being hired, Bill Busch and Nancy Becknell created a praise choir to fit in with the contemporary worship service that had begun meeting at 9:00 on Sunday mornings. As a result, Taras needed to be responsible for directing two choirs, each requiring different types of music.

Throughout the years, Bethany has greatly benefited from Taras' creativity, especially the pieces he composed for the choirs and the

wonderful children's Christmas pageants that he created with Emil Bertalot. During the Pandemic this past year, Taras has been creative in finding a way for choir members to sing separately and then combining the voices in a recording for our worship services.

We have also enjoyed the impressive and beautiful Christmas and Easter cantatas and other special music directed by Taras each year!

During these past 20 years, Bethany has also benefited from the contributions of Lori Nahirniak. In addition to conducting the choir when Taras plays the piano accompaniment, she has, for many years, enthusiastically and lovingly directed our children's choir!





# **PASTOR'S COLUMN**



# "COVID-19 Safety Plan" for Phased Reopening Adopted

For over a year now, the members of Bethany's Board have been carefully monitoring developments with the pandemic, and

making decisions to help keep us safe. I am grateful for their hard work — these have not been easy decisions!

As part of this process, the Board has been examining how we can safely reopen, as vaccination levels increase and as infection rates decrease. Special attention has been focused on recommendations coming from medical experts at the Centers for Disease Control, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, and Public Health Madison & Dane County. We have also received recommendations from the Wisconsin Council of Churches, which has been very helpful in compiling the information from medical experts and examining how these recommendations can best be implemented in church settings.

In line with the recommendations of medical experts, Bethany's Board has now approved a phased reopening of activities on the church grounds and in the building. This reopening will be done cautiously in several steps:

- ⇒ April 27 Outside groups may schedule meetings on the church grounds.
- ⇒ May 6 Inside small groups (up to 10 people) may schedule meetings to be held in well-ventilated rooms, including fellowship hall, the library, the chapel, the youth room, and the sanctuary.
- ⇒ June 1 Inside medium-sized groups (11-25 people) may schedule meetings to be held in fellowship hall or the sanctuary only.
- ⇒ June 13 Worship with attendance limits resumes in the sanctuary, with overflow in fellowship hall. Congregational singing will not be allowed at first. Worship will be simulcast on Zoom. Please note that the June 13 date is tentative the opening date may be delayed if conditions warrant.
- ⇒ September or October? Worship with loosened restrictions will finally be possible. We will continue to offer a simulcast on Zoom.

As part of all this, we will ask that you covenant to take numerous precautions to protect each other's health. Precautions include 6-foot distancing, wearing masks, no food-or-drink, special attention to sanitizing, and more. Numerous modifications have been made to the ventilation equipment in the building, with improved filtration of the air in the sanctuary, fellowship hall, library, lobby, offices, chapel, and youth room. (Note that the second floor classrooms will be unavailable at first, since these rooms lack a ventilation system. If the pandemic lingers into the fall, we may choose to spend about \$10,000 to install air purifiers in these rooms.)

The Board has developed and adopted a thorough, 12-page "COVID-19 Safety Plan." It is available on our website at www.bethanymadison.org. I encourage you to review it, especially the covenant for caring for each other that appears on pages 4-5 of the document. I look forward to seeing you in person!

# Simple Gifts for May — "The Playing Field"

Simple Gift offerings made during May are going to support our partners at The Playing Field, which is dedicated to breaking down the barriers faced by low-income families in accessing high-quality early childhood care and education.

The Playing Field is an independent, nonprofit organization that has rented space inside Bethany United Methodist Church since its opening in August 2015.

For a family who can afford it, Madison offers a wide choice of high quality early childhood programs. The Playing Field is committed to making the highest level of quality available to children from varied backgrounds while seeking to care for children in the context of our diverse community. This is a beginning step towards minimizing the disparity between our youngest citizens.

As part of The Playing Field's (TPF) commitment, enrollment spaces are reserved for children based on three specific funding sources: A third of TPF's enrollment spaces are reserved for families who might choose any high-quality program for their child, but choose The Playing Field because they value diversity and support the center's mission. For another third of the students, TPF attempts to raise scholarship funds to assist families who don't qualify for childcare subsidies, or who would incur very high co-payments. And for another third of its students, TPF reserves spaces for families funded by Early Head Start. Families experiencing homelessness are given priority for these funds and welcomed into the school family.

Although Bethany is currently not meeting in person due to COVID-19 safety measures, your offerings remain important so our mission can continue. Please either mail in your offering or you can give online at BethanyMadison.org (click on We Serve and, from the drop-down menu, select Giving Financially).

Please give generously, as your support will make a difference in real and relevant ways.

The Playing Field also has a wish list of items that are needed to equip classrooms. ### **BOOK BROWSERS**



### **REFLECTIONS BOOK STUDY**

Reflections Book Study will meet Monday, May 24 at 1:00 pm via Zoom. The book for May is *Walking With Abel — Journeys with the Nomads of the African Savannah* by Anna Badkhen.

In *Walking with Abel*, the author embeds herself with a family of Fulani cowboys — nomadic herders in Mali's Sahel grasslands — as they embark on their annual migration across the savanna. The Fulani, though, are no strangers to uncertainty. Brilliantly resourceful and resilient, they've contended with famines, droughts, and wars for centuries.

Badkhen narrates the Fulani's journeys and her own with compassion and keen observation. As they cross the Sahel, the savanna belt that stretches from the Indian Ocean to the Atlantic, they accompany themselves with Fulani music, which they download to their cell phones and tales of herders and hustlers, griots and holy men, infused with the myths the Fulani tell themselves to ground their past.





This is sure to be an interesting topic and lively discussion. Join us whether you have read the book or would just like to listen.

# UNITED METHODIST WOMEN—MISSION U 2021 🏸



Each year, United Methodists prepare for faithful living and action by participating in Mission u, a transformative education program of Unit-

ed Methodist Women that offers study on biblically grounded curricula. This year Mission u is going online with sessions being held on Tuesday and Thursday evenings in May, June, July and August. Four studies are being offered, each class meeting for 4 sessions over two weeks. The studies will be:

#### Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in School

Monique W. Morris' Pushout shows how even with obstacles, stigmas, stereotypes and despair, black girls still find ways to breathe remarkable dignity into their lives in classrooms, juvenile facilities and beyond, and challenge the rest of us to do the same. Study Leaders: Rev. Jonah Overton, is church planter and Pastor of Zao MKE Church in Milwaukee. Rev. Afi Dobbins-Mays, is Pastor of Solomon Community Temple UMC in Milwaukee.


## Bearing Witness in the Kin-dom: Living Into the Church's Moral Witness through Radical Discipleship

### **Sunday School projects**



# **SUMMER SERVICE PROJECT**

The Children and Youth Ministry programs invite you to participate in a summer ministry project at Bethany UMC. In the months of June and July, we will be collecting children's books to stock "Little Free Libraries" in Perry County, Alabama. These small wooden structures have been built and installed by Volunteers in Mission (VIM) workers over the past several years, and there is currently a need to fill them with colorful, engaging children's books. Bethany members Bob and Carol Clingan have been involved in this project and share this description:

Volunteers in Mission, while organized and administered under the United Methodist Church, is an ecumenical group whose mission is to be God's hands and feet on the ground to help communities in need around the country. In existence in Wisconsin since the late 1980's, our initial role was to help individuals rebuild homes devastated by natural disasters. While we still do that, we have evolved to assist homeowners in poverty stricken areas with home remodeling needs that are either beyond their financial means and/or help improve the safety of their homes, and enable them to remain in their homes. This has been particularly true for the elderly. Typically, there might be 6-8 such one-week mission trips each year. We stay in a local church, take our own cook, and always come back feeling more enriched for the relationships we have made and, hopefully, the mission we have provided.

For the past three years and, we hope, far into the future we have traveled to Marion, Alabama and partnered with a grassroots organization in Perry County called "Sowing Seeds of Hope." Their mission in one of the poorest counties in Alabama is to help reduce the gap in health care, housing, education, and nutrition that their residents have struggled to overcome. For the past three years we have put new roofs on homes, built accessibility ramps, repaired plumbing and electrical safety issues, repainted homes and businesses, repaired or rebuilt porches and decks, and installed Little Free Libraries in various locations.

### For you to consider:

Do you have a favorite children's book that you would like to donate to a Little Free Library? What book might bring laughter or inspiration to a child? What book might open a child's eyes to a new topic or idea? What book might encourage a love of reading and learning?

Both picture books and easy chapter books are welcome. A labeled collection bin will be placed in the front of the church for contactless drop-off. As per usual during this pandemic, please check in with Carl prior to stopping by the church, so that he can ensure the door is open for you.
