I was born in Minnesota, and received my undergrad degrees in music, music education, and religion from Luther College. I taught middle/high school choir in Arizona and Wisconsin for five years before pursuing graduate degrees. My masters of music in choral conducting is from California State University Long Beach (Bob Cole Conservatory of Music), and my doctorate of musical



arts in choral conducting and pedagogy is from the University of Iowa. I've spent the last five years in North Carolina. I recently finished a job as Director of Choral Activities and Coordinator of Music Education at Meredith College in Raleigh, NC. It was a wonderful community and I thoroughly enjoyed my students. In late March, my spouse matched for OBGYN residency in Madison. This was a delightful surprise, as my spouse was a music major at UW Madison years ago, and grew up in Merrill, Wisconsin. PASTOR'S COLUMN



Reversing Some Troubling Trends, and Offering Hope

I was alarmed at our Wisconsin Annual Conference this year –



there's no other way to say it. Something was said during a normally dry presentation, the Conference Statistician's Report. We were told that the membership in our Wisconsin congregations had decreased by 30% since 2012, dropping from 73,778 to 52,077 members.

That is so sad, especially since it reflects a trend all across the nation – and not just in the United

Methodist Church. We have been experiencing some fundamental changes in our society, with far fewer people choosing to be involved in things like churches and civic clubs and other community organizations. And then on top of that, our denomination has been experiencing painful divisions. Our society and our denomination are polarized, and it is painful to watch.

The picture looks somewhat better at Bethany, at least when comparing our statistics to Wisconsin or our denomination as a whole. Our church membership has dropped 8% during the same period. That's far better than 30%, but still it means that we have had a net loss of 4 participants on average per year. That adds up over time, and it is certainly noticeable if you have been here for one or two decades or more.

The good news is that this trend can be reversed with all of us working together! Welcoming a few additional households more per year than what we have been doing would make a difference over time – and there is no shortage of people who need the hope and care that our church offers. Here are some suggestions for all of us:

Invite, Invite, Invite – About 85% of people get involved in a church because they have been invited by a member. Doing the work of inviting new people is therefore critical to the survival of any

church. But don't think of it as a "job." Inviting people to church is a wonderful gift you can offer. You may feel reluctant to do so, because you don't want to come across as "pushy." But particularly after the isolation of the pandemic, people are craving authentic community and meaning right now. Most people would welcome an invitation.

Friend-y or Friendly? – Most churches see themselves as being "friendly." I think that "friend-y" (without the letter "L") would be a better description. That is, the members may have a lot of friends at church, and they enjoy visiting with them. But if newcomers don't feel instantly welcomed, the church won't feel friendly to them at all. (Another problem is when churches take the "r" out of "friendly" – I'm glad that doesn't happen here!)

Step Over to Say Hello – For our church to continue being truly friendly, we have to step away from conversations with our current friends whenever we see strangers who need to be welcomed. "What if they are already members?", you may ask. Just say, "Hi, my name is _____." Unless they say, "I know, I've been married to you for 25 years," you've just made a new friend!

Help Visitors Make Connections – Introduce visitors to your friends. If they have children, introduce them to Sunday school leaders. If they are interested in music or Bible studies or some other group, introduce them to those leaders. Through your welcoming attitude, you are introducing them not only to Bethany but also to Christ's love!

The Road Home Dane County is dedicated to building long-term relationships with homeless families with children that change lives. The Road Home works with families, not only to relieve the immediate crisis of homelessness, but also to build skills, resources, and relationships that set the stage for long-term success.

To accomplish its mission, the Road Home relies on the help and support of individuals, congregations, and businesses throughout Madison and beyond. It also partners with other nonprofits, government agencies, United Way of Dane County, people with lived experiences of homelessness, volunteers, and donors, to create solutions that work. The idea is that for the greater good of our city and for humankind, we all can and should join together to make a difference because every child deserves a home.

While it might sometimes be hidden from sight, homelessness exists here. Our community suffers from a critical lack of affordable housing, pushing vulnerable families out of housing and leading to homelessness. Researchers estimate that there are between 7,000 to 27,000 more people in need of affordable housing in our community than there are affordable housing units available. They also predict that without intervention, this gap will grow. The cost of homelessness is high — putting families and children at risk for greater physical, emotional, and academic challenges.

The Road Home Dane County, which was originally known as Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Madison Area, opened its doors on April 26, 1999 as an overflow shelter for families who could not be served by the existing shelters. In the years that followed, the Road Home played a growing role in securing funds and support for affordable housing and providing case management to help families find and maintain that housing. In 2018, the Road Home phased out the shelters to focus on housing and support services. The nonprofit currently operates 10 housing programs and serves more than 200 families with children in Dane County each year.

The Road Home also works closely with JustDane's Healing House, an eight-bed recuperative care facility. The Healing House provides a safe place for homeless families when someone needs to prepare for or recover from a medical procedure, childbirth, hospitalization or something similar. In addition to donations, another way for congregations to make a difference for families who have experienced homelessness in our community is by providing meals at Healing House.

Please consider giving generously, as your contributions will make a difference in real and relevant ways.

Children's Sunday School

Ms. Lisa and the children (preschool through 5th grade) continue to enjoy Zoom Sunday School at 9:00 am, prior to Sunday morning worship. By now we all know how to show music videos, highlight illustrations from Bible stories, talk and share (mute and unmute!), and are creative with making art projects work out with whatever supplies families have on hand. Zoom Sunday School will continue in this manner until vaccines are available for children. "For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them." (Matthew 18:20)

Starting on September 12, an in-person Sunday School option will be added to Sunday mornings during the 10:00 am worship service. Children who are in the building will start the worship service with their families in the sanctuary, up through a designated hymn. At that point, children in preschool – 5th grade are invited to walk with a parent (family member) to join Ms. Lisa in Room 223. Ms. Lisa will offer the same Bible story and project shared on Zoom earlier that morning. A second adult helper will be present, though parents (family members) are always welcome to stay for the duration of the class if this helps a child feel comfortable.
