# **Bethany's Peace Fellowship** — Past, Present and Future

Our church has a long history of social activism, including activities and programs to provide awareness and promote action regarding matters of peace, equality and justice.

During the 1980's, a Peace Fellowship group was active for a while. Of particular concern at that time was the buildup of nuclear armaments.

As times changed, there were new concerns and about 40 years later, in June of 2008, a second Peace Fellowship was established. Their goal was to... "seek to promote nonviolent social and political changes in our country and the world by supporting sustaina-



ble and just solutions for conditions of inequality, violence, and repression which deny people their basic human rights." Marge Lyford and Laurie Swimm were co-chairs.

Over the succeeding years, the group sponsored an annual Peace Sunday, with varied topics, speakers, and activities including book studies. Members also provided peace related articles for the Bethany newsletter.

Although membership in the group has dwindled over recent years, they have continued to sponsor Peace Sundays and submit Banner articles.

A question about the future of the Peace Fellowship: Don't you think that because of the increasing division and violence in the world currently, now would be a good time for others to join our group to provide more awareness and direction for our participation in peace matters?

This article is a call for all those who would like to help promote peace and justice to step up and join our Peace Fellowship.

# **Determining Our Direction in the "Bewilder-ness"**

We are entering the season of Lent, which begins with Ash Wednes-



day on March 2nd. We will gather that evening for worship at 6:30 p.m. in the sanctuary (and on Zoom). We remember each year during this season how Jesus was driven into a wilderness for forty days to face a time of testing.

Several years ago, I wrote about how Jesus was driven not just into a "wilderness" (a desert) but into a "bewilder-ness." Burdened by hunger and

deprivation, he faced a time of testing. He wrestled through a time of bewilderment, and in the end affirmed his devotion to God's loving purposes.

We ourselves know what it is to live in bewildering times. All of us

feel lost in a wilderness at one time or another, bewildered by the challenges that the world throws at us – and our world sure has thrown a lot of challenges at us in recent times!

Lent is a time to reflect on our lives and world. We are called to take honest stock of our values, redirect our commitments, and prepare our hearts for Holy Week and Easter. During this season of Lent, we will explore how our faith keeps us steady in the midst of tests and temptations. I hope this will be a meaningful time for all of us, as we seek God's guidance and strength.

### **2022 Special Sundays**

Over the course of 2022, Bethany will participate in several special offering Sundays sponsored by the broader United Methodist Church. # Simple Gifts for March — "Madison Area Food Pantry Gardens"

Simple Gift offerings made during March are going to support the Madison Area Food Pantry Gardens, which is dedicated to providing local food pantries with fresh, nutritious, and culturally relevant vegetables.

This local, non-profit and volunteer organization has grown and donated more than two million pounds of fresh, first-choice vegetables to the Dane County emergency food system since its inception two decades ago.

During more typical times, simple gifts are made by placing loose coins in the offering plates located at the back of the Sanctuary, or by putting cash or a check in mission envelopes. You can also give online by visiting BethanyMadison.org (click on We Serve and, from the drop-down menu, select Giving Financially).

These donations will be used to purchase seeds, plants, supplies, and equipment needed by Madison Area Food Pantry Gardens (MAFPG) to continue to feed our neighbors in need. You can also make a difference by giving your time. Participate in gleaning at Farmers' Markets or work in the gardens. Work begins with planting in April through June. Harvesting starts in early July and continues until the first killing frost, usually in October. You can work once during the season, once a month or once a week.




The organization and its many volunteers plant, tend, and grow produce at a network of 11 gardens across Dane County thanks to generous

landowners, affiliated churches, and donors. These gardens range in size from less than one acre to 12 acres.

Working together with local food pantries and food banks, MAFPG establishes what vegetables are needed by users of the emergency food system. This means MAFPG is able to fill gaps by producing desired vegetables that meet the cultural needs of our community.

MAFPG dates to the late 1990s, when several churches and service clubs began collecting surplus produce from the Saturday Farmer's Market on the Square and from the Fitchburg, Hilldale, and Middleton Farmer's Markets. While more than 2,000 pounds of produce was collected each week, especially in the late summer, it still was not enough to satisfy the need for fresh produce across Dane County's food pantries.



Today, MAFPG reports that in an average year it's able to grow 100,000 pounds of produce while gleaning an additional 50,000 pounds of vegetables.


## **BOOK BROWSERS**



# **AFGHAN FAMILY UPDATE**



You will recall last fall that the Outreach Team approached the congregation concerning our commitment to assist a large, extended Afghan family that had recently settled in the Bethany neighborhood. The Bethany family has responded very generously and, through Brigit Parlow, we are periodically helping them with gift cards for food, household items and, in particularly, purchases of sewing material and thread that the women are using to make pants, shawls, and a dress-like covering over pants. Thank you very much!

Abdul is the only one working as the bureaucracy slowly processes applications for work permits for the remaining family members. Bethany Outreach has partnered with the Refugee Assistance Committee from First Baptist Church to cooperatively address several larger needs that Abdul's family has.

English as a Second Language (ESL) classes have been set up and were to begin in the middle of January. These have been temporarily postponed until all adult family members have undergone literacy screening through the Literacy Network. Both Bethany and First Baptist have a wealth of ESL teachers with long experience that have stepped up to begin once the screening is completed. The plan would be to have separate adult and child classes offered at Bethany two mornings each week.

The photos below and on the next page show Abdul (2nd from right, wearing a hat, in the photo below) and his brothers, a cousin, and an uncle while, others are taken in Abdul's apartment. The rugs on the floor and the cushions around the perimeter are very typical of middle eastern lifestyle.

#### From Luke 6:6-11


