PASTOR'S COLUMN



January 8 during worship we will celebrate Epiphany Sunday. As



part of our worship service, we will celebrate star words. The use of star words, also called "star gifts," is a prayer practice connected to Epiphany and the new year that has been growing in popularity in churches for nearly a decade now. The idea is that a list of intention words, or guiding words, are distributed during the Epiphany worship service. Just as the wiseman followed a star leading them to Jesus, these words are meant to guide us in our relationship with Christ. Words are

drawn at random and used as a guiding word throughout the year.

I have greatly enjoyed this practice for several years now and have heard wonderful comments from others who have chosen a star word. Even if at first, they were skeptical of their word. My star word during the pandemic was creative. While I don't consider myself to be a particularly creative person, I sure lived into that word in 2020! My word for 2022 was amazement. At first, I wasn't sure how to feel about that word. I have primarily focused on the ways God amazes me. And 2022 certainly has been a year of amazement. I had no idea when I choose that word where I would be at the end of 2022!

The idea of a star word is to let the word pick you and resist the temptation to dig around for a 'better' word or to swap with someone else. You may find that the word fits you perfectly. If so, celebrate that, and see how you can be more intentional about sharing your gift with the world. You may find it is a word that offers you the encouragement or challenge you need. If so, receive that gift and let it shape you in the days and months ahead. You may find yourself resisting the word or even wanting to reject the word. If so, explore the source of your resistance, and be open to what this word may have to teach you. Live with your word, reflect upon it, journal about it, talk about it with others, and pray about it. Discover how this star gift may shine its light on you and your path throughout the coming year. You are encouraged to place your star word somewhere you will see it regularly throughout the year to allow consistent reflection on how God has moved through, around, or in connection to that word.

If you are not in worship on January 8 we can get you a star word. I hope you will enjoy the practice as much as I have. I pray that your star word might be a blessing to you in 2023.

Simple Gifts for January — "The Beacon"

As we kick off a new year, Simple Gift offerings made in January are going to support The Beacon. This comprehensive day resource center is a public–private partnership that works to provide community solutions to help men, women, and children experiencing homelessness in Dane County.

Simple gifts can be made by placing loose coins in the offering plates, or by putting cash or a check in mission envelopes. You can also give online at BethanyMadison.org (click on We Serve and, from the drop-down menu, select Giving Financially).

Through the numerous services offered at The Beacon by staff and partner agencies, individuals have an opportunity for a better life. It is committed to offering services in an environment where people feel supported and are treated with dignity and respect.

The Beacon provides a safe shelter for people who are experiencing homelessness seven days a week, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The facility also offers a range of free basic needs and wellness services, including:

- ✓ Light breakfast, coffee, daily lunch
- ✓ Private showers and restrooms
- ✓ Laundry (drop off − same day service)
- ✓ Mail center, phones, and copier
- ✓ Day storage
- ✓ Preventative healthcare
- ✓ Private family areas
- ✓ Referrals for mental health counseling
- ✓ Referrals to case managers
- ✓ Transportation between night shelters



In addition, The Beacon provides a range of housing and job assistance services, including classes and access to a quiet computer lab with internet access, where staff can help with resumes and more.

In 2016, Dane County purchased the building that previously housed the Madison Chamber of Commerce with plans to renovate it and turn it into a day resource center for the homeless. Dane County chose Catholic Charities to operate this multi-service day resource center and also partnered with the City of Madison and the United Way of Dane County. Together — and with support from people like you — this is a unique collaboration between the business, faith, government, nonprofit, and neighborhood sectors. In all, there are nearly 30 partner agencies under one roof working together in collaboration to change homelessness in our community.

Please consider giving generously, as your support will make a difference in real and relevant ways. In addition to financial support via gifts, The Beacon also welcomes volunteers who are passionate about helping change a person's life.

Nearly fifty years later, in 1974, the terminal has declined almost as sharply as Virginia Clay's life. Full of grime and danger, from the smoke-blackened ceiling to the pickpockets and drug dealers who roam the floor. For Virgin-

ia, it is simply her last resort. She embarks on a quest to find the artist of the unsigned masterpiece—an impassioned chase that draws Virginia not only into the battle to save Grand Central but deep into the mystery of Clara Darden, the famed 1920s illustrator who disappeared from history in 1931.


