Men's Spring Study Retreat

The annual Men's Retreat is returning the weekend of April 21—23 at Pine Lake United Methodist Camp. All men, and their sons, are invited — whether a Bethany member or not. The theme for the weekend will be *Change*. Through talks and discussions we reflect on how we respond to change, the sources of how we get our information, changes at Bethany and what is the "pre-post-pandemic" or, the new normal.

In addition to the talks there will, as always, be lots of time for games and exploring the variety of activities that Pine Lake offers.

After the success of last year, we will prepare our own meals in the Oakwood Center (across from the Rader Center lodging). As happened last year, this option will provide more opportunities for a flexible schedule. Meals will include lunch on Saturday and Sunday, dinner Saturday evening and breakfast Sunday morning.

Lodging will be at the Rader Center (think motel-like accommodations). The cost for a shared room will be \$40 per person per night. A private room will be \$80 per person per night. You are welcome to come up Friday evening to enjoy an evening of games and Saturday morning exploration. Or, come up Saturday morning in time for the first session at 10:30 am.

The retreat will formally end after Sunday's lunch. Costs for meals are still being worked out but should not exceed \$40 per person for the four meals.

PASTOR'S COLUMN



Yesterday we celebrated Bethany's 75th Anniversary with a beautiful worship service, luncheon, and program. It was heartwarming to see how many former clergy returned to be part of the celebration. Several people mentioned that Bethany is a



special place. Indeed, Bethany is special to many of us. But, I admit that there are other church families that are also special to me and my family. I share this because I know there are those in our midst who grieve church families that were special to them. Many of you have shared with me the sadness that a church close to your heart has, in recent months, voted to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church. Whether it was a church you attended recently or years ago the hurt, grief and disappointment is fresh. I believe that God knows and shares in our pain and sorrow.

I remember my parents' greatest desire was for their children to get along with one another. How much greater is God's desire for God's children to get along. A few weeks ago in my message I shared a broken heart image. The image was from the scripture story that day and it was an indica-

tion of how God felt when God's children were divided. It was also a vivid reminder of the hurt and sorrow we can feel. In his message

during worship yesterday Bishop Jung talked about what Jesus taught as the most important commandments, love God and love our neighbor. Even though we may be divided we continue to love one another. May we continue to be kind and compassionate. May we continue to embody the love that Jesus taught. During our Soup and Study a few weeks ago we sang "They Will Know We Are Christians by Our Love." The song points out that even while we



work for justice we pray for unity. We can't stop working for justice and full inclusion, and we can't stop praying for and loving our neighbor. I'll be praying for each of you.

Youth Room Space

Experts agree that we are facing a mental health crisis in our nation and the statistics are highest among teenagers. In a March 2022 study, the Centers for Disease Control found that more than 4 out of 10 teenagers feel "persistently sad or hopeless," and 1 in 5 teens has contemplated suicide. These statistics and the need for relationship building are important as we vision for the future of the youth programs at Bethany.

During our youth visioning and planning session a few months ago the need for relationships was emphasized. Incorporating children and youth into the life of the church was identified as a priority. Over the past few years many of our children's ministries and other programs have relocated to different areas in the building. The result is that our youth programs have become isolated in the basement. When our current youth room was designed it was a wonderful space designed to meet the trends for youth spaces of that day and it served our needs for many years. We are so grateful for those who donated time and money to create that space. Now it's time to reimagine youth ministry in a new space.

In envisioning a new space for our youth we want a space where relationships can be formed. We want them to be visible and feel that their presence is important to our church family. Thus, in the next few months Room 228 is being transformed into a multi-purpose space with a coffee house feel for youth and other church activities. We envision comfortable seating and space arrangement that encourages conversation. Room 228 will continue to be available for other church activities. In addition, we have several other classrooms and the chapel available for groups currently using Room 228.

While monetary donations would be greatly appreciated, your prayers for our youth are essential. God is doing amazing things at Bethany. Our Breakthrough Prayer reminds us that with God anything is possible. For youth that are feeling hopeless or disconnected we have the opportunity to offer hope and love. We have the opportunity to offer a safe place that lets them know they are valued and loved.




Soup & Study


