Forum: Faith, Firearms and Forging — Guns to Garden Tools with Jeff Wild

Jeff Wild, a retired ELCA pastor and member of Midvale Lutheran Church, has been leading a protest against gun violence with a new biblical perspective on what makes us safe. Jeff was trained through the Presbyterian Peace Fellowship to coordinate Safe Surrender events (aka gun buybacks) and has assisted seven congregations resulting in the safe surrender of 100 firearms. Presently, two Safe Surrender events are scheduled, one with Covenant Lutheran Church of Stoughton on June 8 and the other with Middleton Community Church on June 15. Full details are on Page 5.



PASTOR'S COLUMN



As I write this note our rescheduled 2020 General Conference is underway and I'm preparing to leave for Charlotte as an observer to what many believe will be a pivotal meeting for the United



Methodist Church. Like many I have high hopes that this General Conference will pass legislation that removes harmful language from our Book of Discipline and seeks to repair the damage done to our LGBTQIA+siblings and their families. I also have some fear of what happens if the legislation doesn't pass. If we don't make the changes that many of us have been anticipating for years. What then?

By the time you read this we may have an answer, or we may still be in the midst of our struggle. Whatever the case, what I'm holding on to is the love I feel for the United Methodist Church. This is not the denomination I was raised in. It is the denomination I chose, or rather, it's the denomination that chose me.

I felt love and welcome in the United Methodist Church that I had not experienced in the church of my childhood. In the United

Methodist Church I experienced a church family and a place where I felt loved and accepted. This is the church that taught me to ask questions about the Bible, my faith and church leaders. This is the church that nurtured my call to ministry and shaped me into the pastor that I am today.

The United Methodist Church is beloved to me and an integral part of my identity. So, whatever happens at General Conference, at this moment I'm holding on to gratitude. Gratitude for the people who have helped me to grow in faith. Gratitude for the pastors and teachers who shared knowledge and grace with me. Gratitude for my parents who instilled in me a love of God and a firm faith foundation. Gratitude for the congregations, large and small, that provided messages of love and acceptance that spoke to my heart. Gratitude to God who continues to work through the people of the United Methodist Church. I pray that our beloved denomination does us proud these next two weeks. And I pray that whatever happens we can continue to be a beloved community of love and grace.

General Conference Update — Regionalization

General Conference has now passed much of the legislation that aims to give The United Methodist Church's different geographic regions equal standing in decision-making.

In what outgoing Council of Bishops President Thomas J. Bickerton called "a historic day for our church," delegates voted 586 to 164 for an amendment to the denomination's constitution that will now go before annual conference voters for potential ratification.

A constitutional amendment requires at least a two-thirds vote at General Conference; the regionalization amendment received 78% of the vote. To be ratified, the amendment also will need at least a two-thirds total vote of annual conference lay and clergy voters. Annual conferences are church regions consisting of multiple congregations and other ministries.

Regionalization has become United Methodist shorthand for a package of legislation that would restructure the denomination. Under the legislation, the U.S. and each central conference — church regions in Africa, Europe and the Philippines — would become regional conferences with the same authority to adapt the Book of Discipline, the denomination's policy book, for more missional effectiveness.

At present, only central conferences have that authority under the denomination's constitution to adapt the Discipline as missional needs and different legal contexts require.

Under the amendment that passed General Conference, each regional conference would have the authority to:

- Establish and publish a regional Discipline with legislation and provision pertaining to church structures within its boundaries, including qualifications and educational requirements of clergy and specialized lay ministries.
- Set standards of character and other qualifications for the admission of lay members.
- Establish and publish a regional hymnal and ritual of church, including for marriage and burial. The rites approved would need to be in line with core doctrines of The United Methodist Church and in accordance with local laws.
- Allow the annual conferences to adopt structures adequate to their mission while upholding General Conference-mandated structures.

Simple Gifts for May — "The Playing Field"

Simple Gift offerings made in May are going to support our partners at <u>The Playing Field</u>, which uses a unique model to offer the highest level of early child care and education to children from varied socio-economic backgrounds.

Bethany United Methodist Church has hoste The Playing Field since its launch in 2015 as an independent, nonprofit organization.



In addition, it was announced earlier this spring that more of Madison's most vulnerable families will get access to free or low-cost child care come January, when The Playing Field opens another location on Madison's far East Side at 2102 East Springs Drive. Located in a former Menards store, the new 15,000-square-foot space will have room for 100 children in 10 classrooms.

Access to child care is an important element for families seeking to move out of poverty. Reach Dane (Early Head Start,) United Way of Dane County, and the City of Madison provide financial support to families seeking access to quality care, which too often is out of reach for many families. Even with subsidized childcare, the rates at many centers are simply too high for struggling families. Unfortunately, this can mean that children most in need of quality early education are not able to access it.

The Playing Field (TPF) is dedicated to changing this reality by making the highest level of early education available to children of varied backgrounds. To accomplish this goal, its enrollment spaces are reserved for children based on three specific funding sources. One-third of TPF's enrollment spaces are reserved for families who might choose any high-quality program for their child — but choose The Playing Field because they value diversity and support the center's mission. For another third of the students, TPF attempts to raise scholarship funds to assist families who don't qualify for childcare subsidies, or who would incur very high co-payments. And for another third of its students, TPF reserves spaces for families funded by Early Head Start. Families experiencing homelessness are given priority for these funds and welcomed into the school family.

Simple gifts are made by placing loose coins in the offering plates, or by putting cash or a check in mission envelopes. One can also give online by visiting BethanyMadison.org (click on We Serve and, from the drop-down menu, select Giving Financially).

Please give generously, as your support of The Playing Field will make a difference in real and relevant ways.

In addition to May Simple Gifts support, TPF also has a wish list of items that are needed to equip classrooms. FORUM: FAITH, FIREARMS AND FORGING

Guns to Garden Tools with Jeff Wild Sunday, May 19, 11:15 am in the Chapel



Jeff Wild, a retired ELCA pastor and member of Midvale Lutheran Church, has been leading a protest against gun violence with a new biblical perspective on what makes us safe.

Jeff's opinions about firearms were most deeply formed by ten funerals he presided over in his ministry of men who died by suicide — six of them using a gun. As he said "I knew these people. I grieved their deaths and knew the implications and ramifications that it had on the loved ones that really affected me to the core." To that end, he sees the voluntary surrender of firearms as a new angle in the rigid gun control debate in our country, stressing there is room to encourage some to get rid of guns laying around, and for all to reflect on our safety anew.


As a blacksmith, Jeff's beliefs, while forged from funerals, were further inspired by his affiliation with RAW Tools an organization that forges guns into garden tools founded by a young Mennonite pastor Michael Martin after the heinous massacre at Sandy Hook.

Jeff was trained through the Presbyterian Peace Fellowship to coordinate Safe Surrender events (aka gun buybacks) and has assisted seven congregations resulting in the safe surrender of 100 firearms. Presently, two Safe Surrender events are scheduled, one with Covenant Lutheran Church of Stoughton on June 8 and the other with Middleton Community Church on June 15.

Jeff sees his purpose to be a resource for congregations and pastors that are willing to dialog about prevention of gun violence and learn more about the guns to garden tools movement spreading across the United States. Jeff has given many demonstrations at church sites in Dane County, St Paul and Kansas City. This year he is providing hand spades to gardeners who serve community food pantry gardens and they will be asked to fill out a survey of the effect of the garden tool has upon them as a gardener.
